Liberals in some Cities will also be faced with Referenda on Directly Elected Mayors.

Assembly Disgusted at Liberal Democrat "U Turn"!

This was passed at the Liberal Party Assembly on Saturday 16th October 2010 in Wolverhampton.

Tuition Fees.

Assembly notes that the desire that

"none shall be enslaved by ignorance ,poverty and conformity"

appears in both the constitution of The Liberal Party and the Liberal Democrats.

Assembly believes that the proposals of the coalition Government in respect of university tuition fees are likely to foster at least two of the above maladies if not all three.

For this reason amongst others, assembly is resolved to fight the government's proposals by all means available .

The Liberal Party restates its belief that higher education tuition fees should be free to students and funded out of general taxation .

Assembly is fully aware of the present economic climate, however it believes that the education of future generations should not be fettered by the ability to pay or pay back tuition fees but rather should be prioritised ahead of spending billions on nuclear weapons, ahead of cuts in corporation tax and ahead of bankers bonuses

Assembly condemns the continued expression of the above desire in the constitution of the Lib Dems as being wholly inconsistent with the actions of their leadership and further condemns the breaking of their direct pledge to the electorate not six months after obtaining a share of government.

The Liberal Party Assembly resolved to campaign alongside students to fight the coalition plans.

Other Assembly Resolutions passed

The following topics were amongst those dealt with at our recent Assembly in Wolverhampton:

1.VAT and Fuel

The Liberal Party notes with concern that the pending increase in VAT from 17.5% to 20% will hit the poorest sections of the community.

(This motion went on to call for funding of a nationwide home insulation programme to protect people from fuel poverty).

2. The Obama Presidency

This motion criticised Obama for failing to deliver on so many of his promises.

3.Modern Foreign Language Teaching

This motion deplored the state of MFL Teaching in state schools.

4.Campaigning Strategy.

This motion commits the party to campaigning to emphasise our differences from the Lib Dems and while admitting the need to cut the deficit calls for more money to be raised through income tax.

5. Drugs Policy

6. Leasehold Reform and Low Rent Leasehold

This motion reaffirms Party Policy and commits us to campaigning for easier ability for the owners of leasehold flats to obtain Freeholds via management companies made up of the freeholders.

7. Registered Social Landlords, Starter Tenancies.

This motion calls for all new Social Housing Tenancies to initially be 6 month starter tenancies to minimise serious ASB issues.

8. The Big Society

This motion calls on the Government to implement its “Big Society” via devolution of Local Authority powers down to Parish and Neighbourhood Level with recognition of the role of Councillors as Elected Leaders of their Communities.

The Coalition Government

The Liberal Party Response

We in the Liberal Party are disappointed but not surprised by the path followed by some of our former colleagues in the 'Liberal' Democrats in entering into a coalition with the Conservative Party.

The voice of liberalism, which has long been muted in the 'LibDems' has now finally been silenced, as the LibDems choose to prop up a half baked (and electorally unsuccessful) Conservative Government.

In so doing they have turned their back on any claim to be the voice of liberalism. They have chosen to support the party of privilege and patronage over liberty and equality. They have treated with contempt the voters who chose to vote LibDem in direct rejection of the Conservative agenda. They have disowned those who made a positive choice to vote LibDem in order to see their policies implemented. They have betrayed the party workers who have worked hard to promote the centre left of politics by rushing to the rescue of the political right.

We in the Liberal Party are resolved to maintain a Liberal voice in British politics. We will have to shout a bit louder now. We have resolved not to do deals with socialists or Tories but to maintain our liberalism. As our 2010 manifesto stated:-

'All of the major political parties reflect, to a greater or lesser extent some degree of liberalism, after all we live in a LIBERAL democracy. Such a reflection is insufficient for liberalism to be effective. Liberalism should not be diluted, it needs to be applied on a broad front to the whole spectrum of problems facing the individual, the nation and the world today. We need the substance of liberalism, not the reflection. The Liberal Party aims to provide that substance.'

We invite liberals in all parties and none to join with us in our fight for a liberal society; to help us inform the political debate with Liberal policies, Liberal philosophy and Liberal solutions.

We want to help create a liberal society in which every citizen shall possess liberty, property and security, and none shall be enslaved by poverty, ignorance or conformity.

We do not want to live in 'Con – Dem – Nation'

Meeting just after the original Coalition Agreement was published the National Executive Committee of the Liberal Party thought that there were several points in the Coalition Agreement with which we agreed. However the actions of the Coalition Government in recent weeks show an almost total abandonment of Liberal Principles.

We are aware of some voices of Liberal dissent within the Coalition and we urge those Liberals to come home!

Local Elections 2010

Despite their being held on the same day as the General Election, Liberals across the Country did remarkably well on May 6th. losing only one seat, in Slough, to the Conservatives. With the exception of Liverpool, most Liberal Council seats are held against Conservative opposition.

How successful Liberals coped on May 6th

Liverpool

Liverpool Liberals were aware that the prospect of a double local and general election would bring out additional Labour Voters who do not normally vote in local elections and "confuse" some voters who may have cast a Liberal Vote in Local elections into voting Labour, believing both ballot papers were for the General Election

To combat this we started a campaign the previous summer ensuring we did a personal visit to every household in the ward, we left a personally addressed letter to the residents if they were not in and went back to many a second time

We also sent our usual street letters and encouraged the voter registration for postal votes. This year our Tuebrook Stoneycroft Ward postal vote more than doubled from 600 to 1300.

A postal voter is at least twice as likely to vote than the walk down on the day voter, we delivered an election appeal to them two days before they received their ballot papers

During canvassing we signed up over 100 postal and proxy voters prior to the deadline

On the polling week with the talented assistance of Mike Butler we produced a first class gloss A3 leaflet which in an letter spelt out the nature of the two different ballot papers and promoted positively why residents should keep the Liberal Party team spelling out we provide more advice centres than any other councillors in the city and fund Community Advice and Home Security kits for thousands of local homes

On polling day Chris Lenton organised three excellent special letters targeted to key polling stations to push our voters out and challenge potential Labour supporters

Across the city we polled 6%, the Lib Dems dropped below 30%. The Green vote dropped back a little and our Conservatives did not come anywhere within striking distance of winning a seat. Labour took 9 seats from the Lib Dems who ran a standardised bland city wide campaign which was very anti-Labour and said little of what their ward councillors had done locally

Wyre Forest

In view of the double election we took the decision that this year we would not bother with "name on the ballot paper" Candidates but would simply target the two Wards which we held as both Wards were facing changes of Candidates. Siri Hayward was standing down after 14 years in Offmore Comberton, where we were lucky to have Rose Bishop a well known Community Campaigner as Candidate, whilst in Greenhill Rachel Akathiotis (Lewis) was also standing down.

The Greenhill Campaign also had the extra problem that Paul Harrison, elected as a Liberal, had gone Independent last year and subsequently defected to the Tories, whilst Rachel's poor health and family responsibilities had meant she had been unable to do more than the minimum of Council work in the last two years, Tim Ingham is the son of a much loved former Lib (and Lib Dem) Cllr. but that was no guarantee of success!

Wyre Forest with the unique Independent MP also had the problem of "his "Independent Health Concern Councillors. Once we realised that the two elections would be on the same day, we calculated that a Liberal in Broadwaters would ensure that the Tories defeated the Health Concern Leader, whilst Health Concern in Greenhill would get in OUR way; we therefore did a deal not to oppose each other and to endorse each others Candidates in the two Wards.

We kept up our monthly A3 FOCUS Newsletters until March 28th and between then and Polling Day , we delivered 3x3 leaflets, 2xA4 leaflets and a personalised letter to every household PLUS an addressed letter to every Postal Voter (around 1,500 in total). In addition in Offmore Comberton every household received an A6 dayglo orange poster and we sent about 500 personal letters to voters who sent Focus reply forms in. We had Tellers on every Polling Station and resisted the Tory onslaught well holding BOTH seats. The Lib Dems failed to gain the seat they hoped to win, Tories gained 3 from Health Concern and Labour made no progress!
